

I have clearly elucidated across various for the necessity for organizations and business enterprises to carve out distinctive niches as a means of cultivating clientele loyalty. This is important because of intense competition among organisations. A logo is a symbol usually composed of words, images or colours. The primary function of a brand logo is to convey a specific message, rooted in a value proposition. For example, Rotary as a Global organisation established in 1905, has a Brand Logo composed of a wheel with a few lines, which in essence illustrate "civilization and movement". Any item that bears the Rotary logo signifies one element;

"service to humanity anchored on "serving above self" as a Principal Motto.

This motto epitomizes Rotary's commitment to global volunteerism, a cause fervently embraced by all Rotarians.

"Access to clean water and proper lighting are basic necessities that every child should have," Pearl explains. "For the children living with disability at Ishekye, these improvements mean more than convenience; they mean safety, dignity and better opportunities for learning."

Addressing Key Challenges and Defining Success

Pearl recognizes that the challenges ahead are formidable. The logistics of installing water systems and solar panels in a rural setting require careful planning and coordination. In order to ensure sustainable maintenance of these facilities, the club will partner with nearby clubs that can carry out frequent visits.

Success, for Pearl, will be measured not only by the completion of these installations but by the tangible improvements they will lead to in the children's daily lives. "Success will be children no longer having to trek long distances for water and being able to study and play in a well-lit environment," she says. "It will be seeing their smiles and knowing we've made a lasting difference."

The story of the Rotary Club of Akright's Hope Creator Year

The Rotary Club of Akright's
Hope Creator Year has been one of

(1) Reviving Hope at Bukalabi Primary School
Under the visionary leadership of
Hope Creator President Paul Nsubuga, our signature project focused on revitalizing Bukalabi Primary School in Nakaseke District. Established in 1913 by the Church of Uganda and the local community, this school, now government-aided and under the Universal Primary Education (UPE) programme, has a long history.
The Uganda Liberation War of 1981-86 left the school in ruins, with all classroom buildings either destroyed or

Addressing Mental Health

Mental health emerged as a priority area during our Hope Creator Year. Recognizing its growing importance, we launched the "Walking Rotarian" initiative to raise awareness about mental health and well-being. Our Walking Rotarian, Shyaka Mbanda, has made strides in reaching a wider audience, educating the public on mental health issues and promoting a culture of support and understanding. He has traversed the countryside walking thousands of kilometres with the aim of impacting society through these awareness initiatives.

in a state of disrepair. The two-classroom block that survived the war was eventually condemned and demolished due to safety concerns.

Our project aimed to restore Bukalabi Primary School to its former glory, ensuring a bright future for the children of Nakaseke District.

The Rotary Club of Akright City identified the construction of two classrooms at Bukalabi Day Primary School as our signature project for the year 2023/24. This initiative, aimed at enhancing basic education and literacy, has been a testament to our commitment to creating sustainable impact through infrastructure development and community health initiatives. The Hope Creator Year has been a period of profound impact and community upliftment. Through our focused efforts on education and health, the Rotary Club of Akright has not only improved infrastructure and access to essential services, but also fostered hope and opportunity within our communities. Building Foundations for the Future at Bukalabi P/S

The cornerstone of our efforts was the construction of a two-classroom block at Bukalabi Primary School. This initiative was not merely about building structures; it was about laying the foundation for future generations to thrive. Recognizing the importance of a conducive learning environment, we embarked on this project with a clear vision: to provide a safe, modern, and well-equipped space where students can focus on their education without the hindrance of inadequate facilities.

To quote President Paul Nsubuga: "The signature project was to provide a conducive learning environment by

i). School enrolment has risen from 315 students in 2023 to 411 learners.

ii). The planting of 310 fruit trees has improved the school grounds, with each tree being cared for by a student.

iii). The school achieved the highest number of first grades in its history, with seven students attaining this iv). The borehole has been repaired at a cost of UGX 4,080,000, ensuring a constant flow of fresh, clean potable water.

constructing a two-classroom block in Nakaseke District, a UPE primary school, and renovating a borehole to provide clean water for the school and community." This vision came to life through the tireless efforts of our members and the generous support of our partners.

Enhancing Access to Clean Water

In tandem with the construction of the classroom block, we addressed another critical need: access to clean water. The renovation of an existing borehole at the school was a pivotal part of our project. This borehole now serves not only the students but also the surrounding community, ensuring that clean water is available for drinking, cooking, and sanitation. The significance of this cannot be overstated, as access to clean water is fundamental to health and well-being.

Community Engagement and Environmental Stewardship

The project's inauguration was a memorable occasion, graced by the presence of 9214 District Governor Francisco Ssemwanga and Country Chair Ismail Mukasa. During the event, our members and dignitaries planted trees around the school premises, symbolizing our commitment to environmental sustainability and the nurturing of a healthier planet for future

Beyond Bukalabi, the green activities and environmental initiatives spearheaded by Rtn. Teddy Nabakooza Galiwango and the Rotary Club of Akright where the club has so far planted about 3,500 trees around the estate is a significant contribution to environmental sustainability. Active involvement in environmental sustainability reflects the club's dedication to community service and ecological conservation. Participating in the national tree planting campaign with the Ministry of Water and Environment is also commendable. This effort aligns well with Rotary global environmental goals, of combating climate change, and promoting ecological balance. The continued advocacy for environmental sustainability throughout the "magic year" is inspiring and showcases a strong commitment to preserving and enhancing the natural environment. Additionally, counselling sessions were conducted for the Primary Seven leavers, providing them with guidance and support as they transitioned to the next phase of their education.

Broadening Our Impact: Health Initiatives

The Rotary Club of Akright extended its impact through various health-related

initiatives.

- Monthly immunization sessions at Sissa and Wamala have been a critical component of our health outreach, ensuring that vulnerable populations receive essential vaccines. Thanks to Rtn. Naftali Muhumuza whose effort deserves recognition in this magazine. These sessions serve local communities on the periphery of Akright City, which are instrumental in providing labour to the residents of the Akright community.
- The participation in the cancer run to raise funds is another commendable effort by the Rotary Club of Akright. Engaging in activities to support cancer research and treatment represents a critical intervention in the ongoing battle against this devastating disease. Here are some key points highlighting this initiative:
- Our collaboration with Entebbe Road Corridor Clubs led to the organization of a medical camp at Mildmay in Seguku. This event was a significant success, offering medical consultation, treatment, and services to those in need.
- Additionally, our members participated in a blood donation drive, contributing to the global effort to save lives.

The Government of the Republic of Uganda, through the Prime Minister's Office, provided 150 pieces of iron sheets for the roofing of the two-classroom block.

- Nakaseke District Local Government has contributed five million shillings towards the construction of the twoclassroom block with a promise to provide furniture once the building is completed.
- Individual Rotarians with attachment to the area are providing both financial and in-kind support to the school, such as scholastic materials.

Climate change: Our

As we usher in a new chapter for the Rotary Club of Akright with the installation of our new and dynamic President, Pearl Habomugisha, it is imperative to reflect on the pressing issue of our time—climate change. This article aims to provide a deeper understanding of climate change, its far-reaching impacts, and the opportunities that arise from tackling this challenge effectively.

Climate change should not evoke a sense of despair but rather, inspire us to work hard to outlive its horrific effects.

Understanding climate change

Climate change refers to the significant alteration of weather patterns over extended periods, influenced by a combination of geographical and local factors. While local conditions shape regional climates, the impact of greenhouse gases (GHGs) alters the climate on a global scale.

The greenhouse gas effect, caused by gases like carbon dioxide (CO2) and methane (CH4) in the Earth's atmosphere, traps the sun's heat, warming the climate similarly to how glass functions in a greenhouse. This effect is crucial for maintaining the climate we know; without it, the Earth's average temperature would be a frigid -19°C, rendering it a frozen, lifeless water mass.

However, human activities over the past 200 years have intensified the greenhouse effect by increasing GHG concentrations, particularly CO2 and methane. CO2 levels have risen by 36% in the last two centuries, leading to higher global temperatures and climate changes. This intensification is why climate change is now recognized internationally as a grave threat.

The consequences of ecological genocide

As the world grapples with the repercussions of climate change, poorer nations demand compensation from developed countries responsible for a significant portion of global warming. Locally, regionally, and globally, we witness the swift decimation of our planet due to extreme climate changes resulting from human actions.

This phenomenon, where we are all contributors, knowingly or unknowingly, profoundly impacts our lives and posterity. Our misuse and destruction of Earth's resources, beginning with the Industrial Revolution and continuing with recent decades of greed, have debased many productive sectors in Uganda. This irresponsible exploitation has increased the country's temperatures, leading to climate variability.

Over the last decade, we have encountered new phenomena like El Niño, floods, wildfires, tsunamis, and the emergence of new lakes. These catastrophic events impact biodiversity and pose significant threats to humanity. Though these effects are already visible, addressing ongoing anthropogenic actions can avert future crises.

Human activities contributing to climate change

In Uganda, several studies have shown that specific human activities significantly impact climate change and global warming. Over the last 15 years, massive deforestation for building materials, firewood, and other selfish reasons has destroyed forests and

woodlands that act as windbreakers.

Poverty has driven many rural populations to reclaim wetlands and swamps for farming, affecting the local climate. In regions like central, eastern, and southwestern Uganda, swamps have been reclaimed for rice, Irish potato, and flower farming.

In the greater cattle corridor, areas like Nakasongola and Rakai have seen

wooded vegetation cut down for charcoal burning.

The booming housing industry demands significant timber, leading

to extensive deforestation through commercial logging and illegal timber exploitation.

The construction industry's destruction of hilltops and water catchment areas has caused floods, like those in Bwaise, Kampala, and landslides in Kabale, which claimed over 20 lives in 2009.

Unsustainable agricultural practices, such as bush burning and farming on steep slopes, have also contributed to

environmental degradation. The use of chemicals in flower farming has caused siltation in lakes and rivers, leading to their drying up, as seen with River Rwizi in Mbarara. Without proper laws and regulations, these activities have long-term, adverse effects on nature and climate, potentially causing crises that could surpass terrorism in severity.

Evidence of climate change in Uganda

There is overwhelming evidence that climate change is already affecting Uganda. In 2007, the country experienced the heaviest rains in 35 years, causing major flooding, particularly in Northern Uganda, destroying crops, spreading diseases, and affecting thousands of people. In the Rwenzori region, icecaps and glaciers have receded by 40% since 1955, threatening water supply from rivers like Nyamwamba and Mobuku.

Severe drought in the Karamoja region between 1991 and 2000 caused food insecurity and loss of livelihoods, fuelling regional conflicts. Southwestern Uganda has experienced the fastest rate of warming, with temperatures increasing by 0.3°C per decade and more frequent, severe droughts. The 2009 drought resulted in significant livestock and crop losses.

Around Kampala, more intense rains have overwhelmed drainage systems, increasing the risk of floods, diseases, and disrupting businesses and communities. Lake Victoria's water levels have dropped to their lowest in 60 years. The changing rainy seasons over the last two decades have affected agriculture, increased poverty, and posed grave risks.

Opportunities amid challenges

Despite these daunting challenges, there are numerous reasons for cautious optimism. Addressing climate change effectively presents opportunities for developing renewable energy. Uganda has ideal conditions for renewable energy generation, and many communities lack access to electricity. A global response to climate change could support the installation of renewable energy systems, reducing the environmental impact of activities

like charcoal and firewood use.

Carbon trading presents another opportunity with wide-ranging benefits. With Uganda's low carbon emissions, a global tax or carbon rationing system could enable the country to sell carbon credits to higher-emission countries. This trade could provide substantial income for Uganda, supporting the development of renewable energy and other low-carbon initiatives, such as reforestation. Fuel-efficient stoves offer environmental and health benefits by reducing smoke and preventing

health benefits by reducing smoke and preventing respiratory diseases and burn injuries. These stoves also conserve the environment by reducing the need for firewood.

The signs of climate change are evident, and warnings from respected scientific organizations highlight the potential for catastrophic impacts. However, the situation is not hopeless. The causes of climate change are well understood, and many technologies and strategies to address the problem already exist. Globally, we possess the technology and knowledge to combat climate change. The greater challenge lies in achieving international cooperation and commitment to mitigate climate change and global warming. By working together, we can address this pressing issue and secure a better future for our planet.

A call to action

Climate change is a stark reality with visible signs and dire warnings from scientific communities. However, the situation is not hopeless. The causes of climate change are well understood, and we possess the technologies and strategies needed to address the problem.

The greater challenge lies in achieving global cooperation and commitment to mitigating climate change. As we embark on this new Rotary year under President Pearl Habomugisha's leadership, let us all commit to playing our part in this global effort. By taking action now, we can mitigate the impacts of climate change and secure a sustainable future for our planet.

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
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Rotaract building a better world together

This transformation ignited my passion for mental health advocacy, leading me to walk long distances within Uganda to raise awareness about mental health issues.

Notable Walks

- Masaka to Akright City, Bwebajja: This 150km walk allowed me to engage with Rotarians and Rotaractors along the Masaka-Kampala corridor. A highlight was my interaction with students from Uganda Martyrs University, Nkozi.
- Kisoro to Kabale: In February, I walked from Kisoro to Kabale, culminating in a mental health radio presentation on Hills FM 101.7 FM.
- Jinja to Busia and Back: In March, I undertook my most significant walk to date, covering approximately 370km over 11 walking days from Jinja to Busia and back to Akright City, Bwebajja.

Upcoming Initiatives

This year, I am embarking on new journeys to further our mental health advocacy and support community projects:

1. Sheema to Akright City: I will walk 300km to fundraise for our signature project in Sheema, which involves improving a school for disabled children. The project aims to uplift the livelihood of the students and help them navigate their school with ease by providing solar lighting

and lessening the distances they have to move to fetch water.

2. Dar es Salaam for DCA: I plan to walk 1500km to Dar es Salaam to fundraise for the construction of a mental health unit at Kyamulibwa Health Centre IV in Lukaya district.

The Learnings are themed around:

ii. Continuous Learning: Staying up-to-date with best practices, attending fellowships, being socially connected, and embracing continuous learning were essential.

iii. Consultation: Consulting with many people before making club decisions was critical. "Consult, consult, consult" became my mantra.

iv. Adaptability: Flexibility and openness to new ideas, processes, and challenges were necessary. Often, members would propose great ideas and expect them to be implemented, placing the responsibility on me to follow through. I carried out this role happily to avoid disappointment.

v. Member Engagement: Encouraging members to be part of the team was vital. I never gave up on anyone, even if they were initially unresponsive.

To my fellow Club admins: YOU SHOULD ENDEAVOUR TO LEAVE THE CLUB BETTER THAN YOU FOUND IT. It's also imperative that I use this article to share some of the challenges that come with the job of a Club Admin. These include:

i. The voluntary nature of mem-

bership means that membership and service in Rotary clubs are voluntary, so no one can be pushed around.

ii. Burnout due to the workload and many calendar activities which in many cases require the C/A's participation.

iii. In some cases, being an admin may mean that you are the custodian of finances. Many beautiful initiatives require funding, often beyond the club's budget. This sometimes means digging into personal funds or constantly appealing to members, which can be

The ability to keep up with trends and tastes requires continuous effort and adaptability.

viii. Balancing Responsibilities: Managing administrative tasks, event planning, and balancing work, family, and social life was a significant challenge.



Magic year signature project at Ishekye Unit Primary School is an inclusive educational institution founded by the Church of Uganda. It caters to both pupils with special needs and ordinary pupils. The school is government-aided and currently has a total of 171 pupils.

Achievements

Significant progress has been made in increasing school enrolment, particularly among students with special needs, reflecting a positive trend in inclusive education. This success is bolstered by the provision of wheelchairs, funded by the Member of Parliament of Sheema Municipality, which has greatly improved mobility and access for pupils with physical disabilities. Additionally, the National Union of Disabled Persons in Uganda (NUDIPU) has conducted comprehensive training sessions for teachers and stakeholders, equipping them with the necessary skills and knowledge to support inclusive education effectively.

Challenges

Despite these achievements, the school faces numerous challenges that hinder its ability to provide an optimal learning environment. The urgent need for additional dormitories to accommodate



the growing number of pupils, coupled with the lack of solar energy, affects the school's capacity to maintain a reliable power supply. Accessibility issues are prevalent, with inadequate walkways, insufficient toilet facilities for disabled pupils, and a shortage of bedding. Other critical needs include safe drinking water, more private teachers, and bursaries for disadvantaged pupils.

Additionally, there is a need for infrastructure improvements such as levelling the school compound, repairing classroom blocks, and providing playing materials and special seating for disabled pupils. Administrative challenges include the lack of a staff room, offices, and essential office equipment, as well as the need for a head teacher's house and improved

diet for disadvantaged pupils. Addressing the shortages in medical supplies and textbooks for blind pupils, along with providing a dedicated staff toilet, are also imperative for the school's overall functionality and effectiveness.

Rotary Club of Akright Interventions

To address some of these pressing challenges, the RC Akright City has pledged to support the school with interventions focused mainly on improving water supply and providing solar lighting. These initiatives are crucial in ensuring a sustainable and reliable water source for the students and staff, thereby tackling the significant concern of safe drinking water and general water supply shortages.

The provision of solar lighting will not only enhance the school's power reliability but also promote a sustainable energy solution, supporting evening studies and other activities that require lighting. These interventions by the Rotary Club of Akright City are expected to significantly improve the living and learning conditions at the school, contributing to a better educational environment and overall well-being for the pupils and staff.



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
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
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
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
